


Companion Teaching Activities

To the serialized story for young readers

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Chapter 1

1. Twister mentions sounds that surround the farm. Brainstorm other sounds you might hear on a farm.

Use your sound words to write a descriptive poem on a separate piece of paper.

2. What are the advantages of living at Longmeadow Rescue Ranch?

Search through the newspaper for a place you'd like to live. Cut and paste your picture on a separate piece of paper, and write a short paragraph describing why you'd like to live there.

3. Is "Twist of Fate" a good name for the colt? Use at least two details from the story to explain your answer.

4. What do you think "taking the cart before the horse" means? Use clue words from the story to explain your answer.

5. Name reasons why a horse might be sent to a slaughterhouse. What can we, as citizens, do to protect horses and other animals?

Horses, and other equines, are measure in hands. A hand equals 4 inches. Parts of a hand are given after a decimal point. For example, 10.3 hands is the same as 10X4 inches (40) +3 inches =43 inches. Convert the following measurement to inches.
