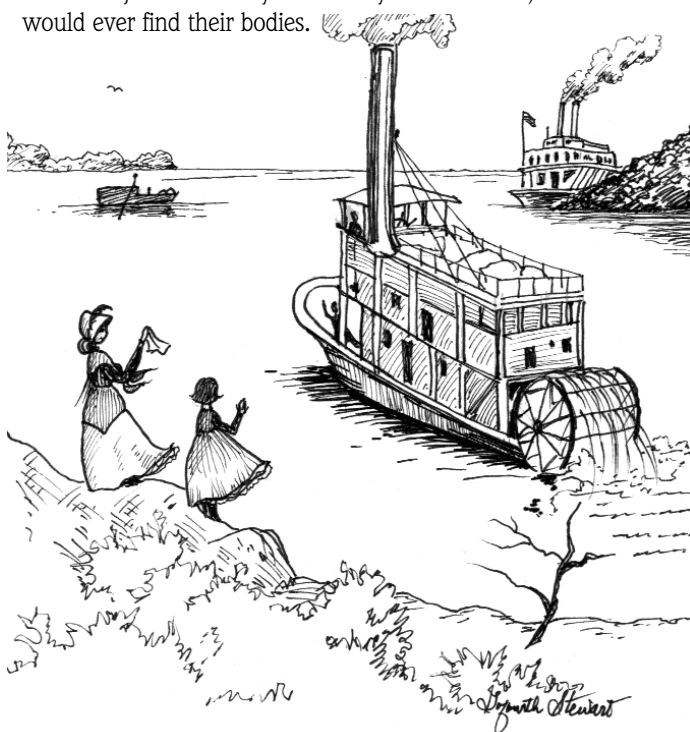
Quickly, the children raced off to the rugged bluffs where all the children in the village loved to play. The bluffs had great rocks to climb over and little caves where kids could hide from each other.
