important visitor as he moved around the country. Dr. Taylor hoped the President would visit the hospital, but no one knew the President's schedule for sure.

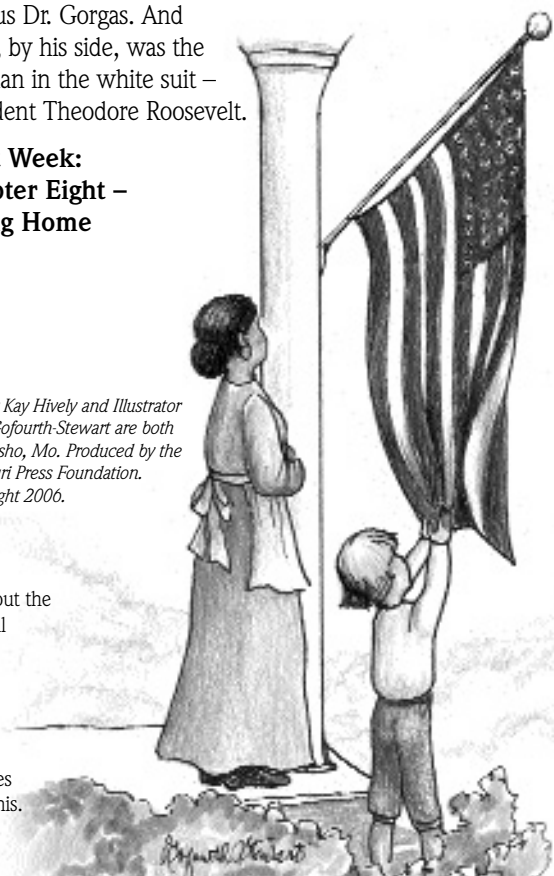
