When his grandfather returned, Ben told about renting the wagon and team. Grandfather said Ben had done a good job.

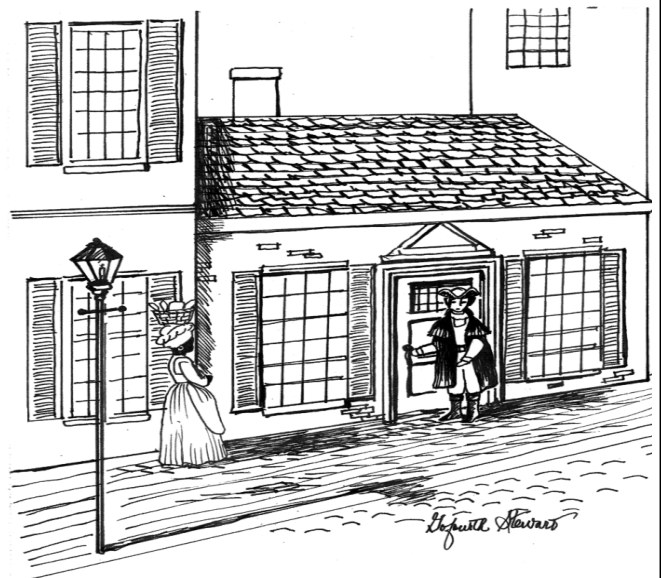
That night the spy catchers met. Ben reported on the man who rented the horses and wagon. The spy catchers decided everyone should look out for the man in the wagon.
