

# Chimps scream, hoot and go ape

Africa is one wild place! The Kid has seen really wild animals in their wilderness homes. We've met wonderful people and marveled at the beautiful scenery.

We've also learned about the delicate balance of people, animals and plant life as we visit endangered species around the world.

If any one part of nature gets out of balance, it can have a bad effect.

Around the world, people push into the wilderness looking for places to live. They cut trees to sell the lumber and convert the area to farms. They hunt wild animals to sell as meat, pets and exotic products.

Diseases like rabies, canine distemper and viruses can wipe out species.

Chimpanzees struggle against all these forces.

Their wilderness homes disappear as trees are cut and cleared for farming. They must compete for food and shelter in a shrinking area.

Chimps catch some of the same diseases as humans. The Ebola virus threatens chimpanzees as well as many humans. Chimps can catch pneumonia from humans.

A hundred years ago, about two million chimps lived in Africa. Today, there are only 100,000 to 175,000 chimpanzees. They live across the forest zone from western Tanzania and Uganda to Guinea.

Chimps are intelligent, curious and social. Chimps are the animal most like a human. They share 98% of our genes.

Chimpanzees are not monkeys. They are apes, like gorillas. Chimpanzees live in groups called troops. The troop has 30 to 80 chimps.

Chimps are 3 to 4-1/2 feet tall. They weight 55 to 110 pounds.

They have a thick body with long arms, short legs and no tail. Their face, ears, toes and fingers are hairless. The rest of their body is covered with black hair.

Chimps have fingers and thumbs that work like a human hand. Chimps use tools. They devise weapons, using sticks as clubs or to throw at an enemy.

Chimps are very noisy! They have a complex communication system. A loud "wraaa" warning call can be heard more than a mile away. The chimps also hoot "hoo-hoo-hoo." They scream, grunt and pound on hollow trees with their hands.

Baby chimps stay with their mothers for about four years. A chimp lives up to 50 years.

Jane Goodall studied chimpanzees at the Gombe National Park in Tanzania, a wilderness area set aside for chimps.

We can also visit orphan chimps at the Ngamba Island Chimp Sanctuary in Uganda.
