- Meet with your counselor to verify everything is in order for you to graduate and to meet college entrance requirements.

- and ask your counselor for suggestions. Improve your chances by applying early. Never pay a fee for scholarship money. Begin writing essays for college and scholarship applications. Ask teachers and counselors to write letters of recommendation. If you plan to play any Division 1 or 2 college sports, register with the NCAA Clearinghouse to ensure your eligibility. Keep your grades up and don't slack off in math! This is an important year to

get ready for college-level

 - Contact the schools to which you submitted applications. Make sure they have what they need from you and follow up with any missing items.

- The application deadline for many schools is between January 15 and March 1. However, some open admissions colleges only require registration by the time fall classes begin. Fill out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) by April 1 to be eligible for financial assistance, such as Access Missouri (www. dhe.mo. govaccessmo.shtml). You will be notified when your Student Aid Report (SAR) is ready; it states the amount of aid for which you are eligible.
- If you applied to schools in January and February, begin looking for admissions decisions in the mail in March and April. Review your college acceptances and compare financial aid packages. When you decide which school you will attend, notify that school and submit any required financial deposit. If you took any Advanced Placement courses, consider taking the AP tests in May in order to qualify for college credit. After the end of the school term, send your final high school transcript to the
