College Is Possible

Some people assume that college is out of their reach because of the cost. Before you blow it off. learn about your options and see what will work for you.

Almost half of all college students receive financial aid. Students can receive a combination of scholarships. grants, work-study jobs, and loans. Missouri is increasing financial aid to help make college a possibility for everyone. Learn more at dhe.mo.gov/ppcindex.shtml.
