Stone Bridge ruins at Bull Run Creek. Sightseers who turned out to watch the first Battle of Bull Run in 1861 got more than they bargained for when the retreating Union Army fled back to Washington, creating panic and chaos along the road and bridge.

Primary Source

After the Confederate victory at First Manassas, rumors spread that Jefferson Davis was at fault for not allowing his army to pursue the retreating federals and attack Washington. Davis determined that General Beauregard was responsible for the rumors and sent him this stern letter.

"Sir: Yesterday my attention was called to various newspaper publications purporting to have been sent from Manassas, and to be a synopsis of your report of the battle of the 21st of July last, and in which it is represented that you have been overruled by me in your plan for a battle with the enemy south of the Potomac, for the capture of Baltimore and Washington, and the liberation of Maryland.

With much surprise I found that the newspaper statements were

sustained by the text of your report. I was surprised, because, if we did differ in opinion as to the measure and purposes of contemplated campaigns, such fact could have no appropriate place in the report of a battle; further, because it seemed to be an attempt to exalt yourself at my expense; and, especially, because no such plan as that described was submitted to me."

After the war, Jefferson Davis published "The Rise and Fall of the Confederate Government," in which he gave his side of the war story.

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
