During the stories, Violet had sat on her soft spot in the wagon and listened to every word her father said. When he was finished, both children asked their parents a few questions about what happened. Violet's mother added that all things considered, this was very good news, and most people were hopeful this would speed up the peace talks between the two countries.

Violet thought peace would be great.




