- Do not open e-mail that is spam or from strangers. Do not respond to sexual e-mails.
- Ask your parents about what to include in your personal profile. Restrict access to your profile to those on your contact list.
- Do not add people to your contact list that you don't know in person.
- Never arrange a F2F meeting with someone you've met online without permission from your parents.
- IM only with people you know in person. Block an IM from someone you don't know.
- Think before you type. Do you want everyone to see what you are writing? Is it hurtful or rude?
- If you receive hurtful, rude or threatening messages, tell your parents.
- Do not post photos online without your parent's approval. Post only to private sites.
- Don't post photos of your friends without permission from their parents.
- Turn off your web cam when you are not using it.
- Tell your parents if you encounter lewd or obscene material. They can report it to [cybertipline.com](http://cybertipline.com).
- Always act as if 9.
