Fire prevention

• Keep things that can burn away from lamps, heaters, fireplaces and candles.

• Don't play around electrical cords. Never stick anything into an electrical outlet.

Don't plug too many things into an electrical utlet

• Don't cook without an adult around. Keep an eye on things that are cooking.

• Don't play with matches, lighters or candles. Blow out candles when you leave a room.

Plan an escape route

• Go through your house with your family. Find two ways out of every room. One way can be the door. Another way is probably a window. Make sure you know how to open the window in your room.

• Plan your escape route. Practice it with your fam-

• Pick a safe place to meet after you get out. It could be a rural mail box, the end of your driveway or a favorite tree in your yard.

Escaping from fire

• Get out fast. Don't take time to get dressed or gather up your favorite things.

• Feel the bottom of each door before you open it. If the door is hot, try to get out another way.

• Stay low. Smoke rises, so the best air is along the

• Once you get out, stay out. Don't go back in.

• Meet at your safe place.

• Use a cell phone or go to a neighbor's house to call 911 after you are out safely.


Smoke alarms

A smoke alarm makes a loud beeping sound. When you hear the beeping sound, follow your escape plan and get out of the house.


• With your parents, check your house for smoke alarms. Is there a smoke alarm near every bedroom?

• Remind your parents to change the battery in your smoke alarm. Many people change the batteries when Daylight Saving Time ends in the fall.


